CAC Update: Basil

- Thank you to the working group. Congratulations on getting the DAC criteria draft out for public comment.
- He recognizes some CJWG members expressed concern their input has been ignored by the CAC and further not reflected by the scoping plan. The Commissioner has heard working group members and so has the CAC. He wants to make sure it is visible how the CJWG's input has been incorporated into the scoping plan.

CAC Update continued: Sameer

- 1. We are providing feedback on how input CJWG members provided has been incorporated into the draft scoping plan.
- 2. Feedback will be outlined chapter by chapter to show where it was specifically incorporated.
- 3. We're on track to provide members with documents by the week of March 21.
- 4. Once members have digested them we will discuss how to engage the CAC going forward.
- 5. Documents will additionally be shared with the CAC so they can discern areas requiring further discussion.

Public Hearing Progress:

- Schedule has been finalized
 - Written public comment period has been extended to June 10,2022
 - Will be holding 10 hearings, 8 in person and 2 virtual

Eddie: Recommends collating and curating feedback the CJWG gave about the various working group recommendations. I would take our feedback and speak to the main 3 buckets of work. eg) gas transitions is 1/3 of buckets of work

Sameer: Let me suggest that to the others. For now CJWG feedback will be broken down by sector.

Eddie: To be clear I mean taking CJWG feedback to the CAC.

Jared: Those three working groups are somewhat cross sectoral. This may mean taking input from different chapters and providing that to those working groups.

Approach for Disadvantaged Community Air Monitoring

Air Monitoring Program update- Jared:

- We are still working out details on the community air monitoring program.
- Overview of strategy to select the community for monitoring:
 - The CLCA requires monitoring in 4 communities.
 - Gov Hochul wants a large-scale screening effort covering 10 communities.
 - Goal: Target areas with higher burdens.
- Will be in better position to identify details after budget is complete.
 - So statewide screening effort plus targeted effort in some communities
 - **Purpose:** Lay groundwork for identifying solutions for areas impacted by high levels of pollution.

Selection of 10 communities- Marilyn Wurth

- DEC values the CJWG's input on the selection process
- Overview of CLCPA (Climate Leadership & Community Protection Act) Requirements
- Slide with language from the law
- Goal of air monitoring is to create emissions reduction strategies by Jun.1,2024
- Started with 45 indicators and ended with 12 environmental burden indicators
- Calculated air pollution burden score
- NY city has the most DACS followed by mid-Hudson, western NY, Finger Lakes, the capital region.
- Explanation and presentation of maps

Marilyn: Would it be helpful if the community had a tool where they could provide their concerns to us? We could then integrate those into the analysis.

CJWG members: Yes. If we could also provide people who are trained, that would be beneficial.

Eddie: How does DEC see these deeper layers of analysis affecting permitting decisions; if at all?

Jared: This is all to inform the problem solving. This monitoring will identify where the problem sources are. eg) heavy traffic in areas, industrial sources etc. Next we need to consider that in decisions we make whether regulatory or permitting.
