I'll just say a few quick 5 remarks right off the top and then, of course, today 6 is all about you and -- and your opportunity to weigh 7 in on the real important criteria that we have in 8 front of us. 9 Again, I'm Basil Seggos, D.E.C. I'm also the co-chair of the state's 10 commissioner. Climate Action Council along with NYSERDA President 11 12 and C.E.O. Doreen Harris. As you probably know, New 13 York has one of the most if not the most ambitious 14 climate laws in the nation. 7 But today, of course, and for the next 8 several weeks we are talking about the criteria 9 related to the -- the disadvantaged communities' definition. And it's really important because it 10 11 helps us to understand where we need to make 12 investments, where we need to direct benefits and 13 what communities across the state need to receive, in 14 particular, this attention that is in the heart of 15 this climate law. So we want your input today on 16 that.

I want to thank the Climate Justice 17 18 Working Group. We have several members of the 19 climate justice working group that dedicated literally months and in some cases many more months. 20 21 Couple of years to come up with this definition and the work behind it. And all the staff that have 22 worked on it between D.E.C. and NYSERDA some of whom 23 24 are on the call today. I want to thank them for all 25 the work that they have done.

The draft disadvantaged communities criteria public 6 comment period commenced in March with a one hundred and twenty day public comment period that ends on July 7th, 2022.

9 The draft disadvantaged communities 10 criteria can be found at Climate.ny.gov. Again, that 11 website is Climate.ny.gov. The criteria are based on 12 geographic, public health, environmental hazard and 13 socioeconomic factors and once approved will be used 14 and help meet the directives of the climate act 15 related to reducing pollution and greenhouse gas 16 emissions as well as to inform regulatory impact statements and the state's clean energy and 17 18 efficiency investments.

19 Notice of this hearing was published in the Environmental Notice Bulletin on May 4th, 20 21 Assisting us today with this hearing are 2022. members of the department's Office of Communication 22 Services and we thank them for their help here today. 23 24 In a moment I'm going to introduce Alanah Keddell-25 Tuckey who is the director of the D.E.C.'s Office of

3 As Basil mentioned earlier, the 4 climate act is the nation's most ambitious climate 5 change related legislation. Its goal is to reduce 6 New York State's greenhouse gas emissions from all 7 human activities by a hundred percent over 1990 8 levels by the year 2050 with an incremental target of 9 at least forty percent reduction in greenhouse gases 10 by the year 2030. At least eighty-five percent of the reductions by 2050 must come from preventing the 11 12 release of greenhouse gases. The remaining fifteen 13 may come from carbon removal projects like soil 14 conservation, growing forests and restoring wetlands. Implementing the climate act will 15

16 create opportunities to build a better future and 17 ensure this work also advances climate justice. The 18 climate act mandates at least thirty-five to forty 19 percent of the benefits of New York State's spending on clean energy accrue in disadvantaged communities. 20 21 State agencies are also required to prioritize greenhouse gas emissions and co-pollutant reductions 22 in disadvantaged communities. This includes D.E.C. 23 24 and the drafting of regulations to meet the 25 greenhouse gas emissions limits that are required by

Page 12 1 Disadvantaged Communities Criteria - 5-25-2022 2 the climate act. 3 The identification and prioritization 4 of disadvantaged communities in accounting of -- of 5 the benefits of cutting pollution and improving resilience is what makes our climate act a 6 7 transformative law. To identify disadvantaged 8 communities in New York the climate justice working 9 group was guided by the language of the climate act in identifying disproportionately burdened 10 communities. They voted to include forty-five 11 12 indicators using data and environmental hazards, 13 climate change risks, public health issues, geography 14 and socioeconomic factors like race, income, education levels, unemployment rates and housing 15 conditions. 16 17 Additionally, the draft disadvantaged 18 communities designations are reflective of the 19 working group, their lived experiences and the lived experiences of the residents of these historically 20 21 overburdened and underfunded communities. Each census tract is scored based on a 22 relative burden, risk, vulnerability or sensitivity. 23 24 Specifically, the percentile ranks of the indicators 25 for each census tract are combined to produce a value

2	that measures a census tract's relative level of
3	environmental burden and climate change risks as well
4	as population characteristics and health
5	vulnerabilities relative to other tracts.
6	Tracts with higher scores relative to
7	other tracts in the state or in their region who are
8	identified as disadvantaged communities. The working
9	group also voted to include low-income households
10	with incomes at sixty percent of the state median
11	income as disadvantaged for the purposes of benefits
12	and investments.
13	On the screen you'll see that there

16	like on the map of the New York City area. Fifty-
17	nine percent of the tracks in New York City are

1 Disadvantaged Communities Criteria - 5-25-2022 2 driven draft criteria developed by the working group. 3 N.Y.L.P.I. also supports the selection of indicators 4 used by the climate justice working group and 5 supports including low-income households for the 6 purpose of directing clean energy and energy 7 efficiency investments. 8 Importantly, we stand by the climate 9 justice working group's acknowledgement that climate

10 change does not affect all New Yorkers equally. And more specifically that climate change 11 12 disproportionately impacts black, Latin, Asian and 13 indigenous communities. The use of race and 14 ethnicity as a factor in identifying disadvantaged communities this critical as legacies of historical 15 16 discrimination on the basis of race and ethnicity 17 result in minority populations bearing the harshest 18 impacts from climate change.

New York State's draft criteria will,
unlike the federal government's equivalent, face the
issues and their roots clearly for what they are.
The efforts to repair decades of environmental racism
must begin with the common sense truth that racism
has to do with race. Such use of race based factors
is constitutional. Equal protection challenges to

2	using racial classifications undergo a strict
3	scrutiny standard in the courts, and under that
4	standard the use of race is constitutional if it is
5	found to be an early tailored measure that furthers a
6	compounding governmental interest.
7	New York has a well-documented past of
8	racial discrimination, and is as evidence in the
9	C.L.C.P.A. and is the heart of the law as the
10	commissioner's statements aptly described it, a
11	compelling interest in remedying the effects of it.
12	The Supreme Court has held that remedying the effects
13	of past intentional discrimination is a compelling
14	interest under the strict scrutiny test.
15	Recent neutral alternatives to
16	identifying disadvantaged communities would not
17	directly address the environmental racism that the
18	C.L.C.P.A. seeks to address which specifically
19	targeted communities based on their race. In
20	conclusion, we urge D.E.C. and NYSERDA to finalize
21	the criteria as drafted by the climate justice
22	working group, and we call for swift implementation
23	of that draft criteria so New York State may properly
24	carry out the mandates of the C.L.C.P.A. The climate
25	justice working group's draft criteria is how New

4 And also because the railroads are 5 hauling unenclosed waste that emits spillage, blow 6 off, leaching and odors. The California Air 7 Resources Board has studied pollution from rail 8 yards, determined there are harms and has developed 9 strategies and taken actions to address harms. 10 Although some communities by rail yards are designated disadvantaged under the draft criteria 11 12 others are not.

13 New York State must specifically 14 include rail yards. And also adjacent tracks in 15 neighborhoods where yard operations take place daily as a factor in determining a disadvantaged community. 16 17 And also modify the scope of the Climate Leadership 18 and Community Protection Act to include strategies modeled after the California Air Resources Board's. 19 20 And on tier four repowering that is 21 already taken place by the Port Authority in New York, New Jersey and waste management that eliminates 22 ninety-five percent of that pollution. The scope is 23 24 terribly out of date in this regard. It's looking 25 forward to hydrogen powered locomotives which are
