- CalEnviro Screen
 - Scores areas via census tract
 - Does not designate communities

Questions?

How does it account for non-census indicators?

- Disadvantages communities definition expanded to consider LMI population in other areas (AB 1150 expands SB 535)

How does this tool help local municipalities?

- It is applicable to local government decision making
 - Local governments actively use the tool

Race was explicitly eliminated

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- Specifically eliminated in areas that were not permitted to use race as a factor when looking at the distribution of funds, etc.

Eddie

- Is interested in the effects of cap & trade on EJ communities and how the funding stream is directed
- CalScreen uses percentile scores
 - pollution burden index x population characteristics creates a single score to see things in one layer
 - Socioeconomic and health factors amplify burdens and characteristics

Disadvantages communities definition

- Based on datasets and traditional markers
 - This includes socioeconomic markers
 - 35% of Climate Investments benefit priority populations
